Equipment Required



- \diamond magnifying glasses
- \diamond taste-testing samples of sugar snap peas
- \diamond taste-testing cups (optional)

Purpose

The purpose of this lesson is to introduce a new food to the children in your classroom. The more times children are exposed to new foods, the more likely they are to eat and enjoy these foods in the future.

Overview

In this lesson, children will describe what a sugar snap pea looks like under a magnifying glass. Children will also share if they like how a sugar snap pea feels, smells and tastes.

Words to Use

- ♦ feel
- ♦ smooth
- \diamond sugar snap pea ♦ crunchy
- ♦ farmer \diamond seeds
- \diamond taste
- ♦ green

Introduction

This activity will work well as a circle time activity and at tables, in small groups, for tasting.

Before the Lesson

- ♦ Select one whole sugar snap pea for children to closely examine with magnifying glasses.
- ♦ Prepare one or more samples of sugar snap peas for the children to taste.

Today we are going to be detectives.

Does anybody know what a detective does?

A detective gathers clues by using his or her eyes, hands, nose, and mouth. We are all going to be food detectives today. We are going to use a magnifying glass, something all good detectives carry, to look closely at a food that many of us have not tried before. After we all take a turn looking at the new food, we get to smell and taste the new food.

THE SEED DANCE

This is a fun movement activity that will help younger children get familiar with the life cycle of a plant, and the parts of a plant. No materials are needed besides the script below – though it's most fun to do outside on a sunny day!

Announce to the children that they are all going to be seeds. "You are a seed. Any kind of seed you want to be. Make your bodies as small as you can." Go around and ask children what kind of seed they are and then remind them that seeds don't talk.

Say "It is the middle of winter and you are covered by a layer of cold snow. Now you start to feel something new, cold water is melting through the soil. The soil is getting warmer, and you feel your sprouting roots and leaves. The sun is shining on your leaves and warming your feet in the soil. Feel your roots grow into the soil and your stems and leaves follow the sun up! Up! Up! You grow more leaves which make more food. You form a bud, which opens into a beautiful flower, and along comes a honeybee to pollinate you, and a heavy fruit starts to grow. Now you are a fully grown fruit, full of seeds and ready to be harvested! We can start this again with another seed."



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FIVE PEAS FROM A PEAPOD




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PEA POD THREADING ACTIVITY

place line against the fold of paper and cut out

Instructions:

Cut the dotted line to separate the peas from the peapod. Make the peapod by folding the paper at the flat, left side of the peapod. Cut out the curvy edges, so you have two halves of the peapod connected at the fold. Color peapod and peas green. Cut out peas. With the peapod folded, punch holes on the curvy edges. Thread the two sides of the peapod together with yarn or a shoelace and then slot the peas inside.



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
