### Flouting of asylum laws and migrant protections causing suffering

Although Title 42 has ended, the U.S. continues to harm migrants and undermine the right to asylum, writes Pedro Rios of AFSC. Today, the U.S. must "recommit to respecting asylum laws, to protecting those seeking safe harbor, and to increasing accountability and oversight measures so that suffering ends when interaction occurs with U.S. border agents."

Myrna Martines Nateras of AFSC writes that, through the PVI Artevism program, we continue offering spaces for dialogue and analysis of the most pressing issues impacting immigrant communities. We have facilitated meetings, discussions, and educational opportunities to get information and identify strategic actions toward addressing the closure of the only hospital in the neighborhood of Madera. The closure of this hospital is having and will have a tremendous impact on the farmworker community of not only the city but the county of Madera. Access to healthcare is a constant challenge for immigrant farmworkers due to their migration status. To receive emergency care, these families must travel about an hour.
