## In a major win, AFSC and partners stop \$40M migrant shelter contract

Thanks to a true team effort between AFSC Colorado, AFSC Economic Activism, and partners on the ground, Denver city leaders have put a halt to a \$40 million contract with the private security company Gardaworld to house 1000 migrants. "The real question is, does Denver want to be the guinea pig for sheltering of vulnerable people with a corporation that has no experience doing that, and only experience in policing and military-style operations?" Jennifer Piper of AFSC asked the <u>Denver Post</u>. "My answer is no," Piper said.

#### **Community questions safety of scattershot munitions**

Thanks to California Healing Justice organizing, Alameda County community members recently <u>called on county leadership</u> to oppose the Sheriff's plan to stockpile "less lethal" munitions. Both local community members and international experts also called on the county to issue a ban on using the dangerous, indiscriminate "scatter shot" munitions. (<u>Scattershots</u> are "less lethal" munitions that issue a spray of munitions, making them impossible to aim.) While no decision in either direction was reached, the county will likely continue its deliberations over the coming months.

#### Farm to School project completes successful eight-year run


After wrapping up the 2022–23 school year in June, the AFSC New Mexico's Farm to School project is transitioning. Since 2015, AFSC NM has worked with the New Mexico Department of Agriculture, multiple school districts, and charter schools to direct state money to schools to purchase locally grown food. Recently a slate of new food and hunger legislation was passed in New Mexico with far more robust financial and administrative support available to both schools and farmers. ### **Trellises workshop builds community**


