Project Voice Immigrant Rights Program, Oregon-Washington

Lifting up the human rights and dignity of people who migrate

In this <u>interview</u>, Pedro Sosa and Alonso Oliveros of AFSC describe the motivations behind their immigrant rights work in the Pacific Northwest. "I do this work because I'm an immigrant," Pedro says. "I know firsthand the suffering. For many years, I was without documentation. I was arrested by Immigration and detained. I know how it feels to be in detention."

Alonso adds, "I grew up as the son of immigrants from Mexico. I do this work to give voice to the voiceless. To use my privilege to confront all the trauma and brutality the immigrant community has suffered. To empower them." Read more.

Another migrant has died near open-air detention sites in San Ysidro, CA

On February 6, another migrant died along a canal near two open-air detention sites. According to local news **reporting**, he was found and pronounced dead by San Diego Fire-Rescue Department. We don't yet know his identity or nationality. This marks the third death since October 11 when a 29-year-old woman from Guinea lost her life. A second death, a man also from Guinea, occurred in the same area on November 17. **Read more**.
