Youth Organizing Program kicks off

Crystal Gonzalez of AFSC reports that Roots for Peace recently launched the second year of our Youth Organizing Program. Seven youth interns, most of whom are alumni from Summer Freedom School and other programming, represent four local high schools.

As interns they will put their leadership skills and divest/invest frameworks into practice. Youth will organize on their respective campuses to grow the movement for divesting from policing on public transit and push for a fareless transit system in Los Angeles. "For Cause Eviction" bill gains traction in Colorado

From <u>Facebook</u>: A neighborhood is more than just the place we live. It's the people in our community that make it feel like home. Yet, corporate landlords remind us every day that our homes belong to the highest bidder. A "For Cause Eviction" law protects renters by limiting the reasons a landlord can evict or not renew a lease, ensuring that corporate landlords cannot unnecessarily uproot families from their homes and communities. AFSC and allies encourage Coloradoans to urge their lawmakers to support this bill.

New bill to protect the integrity of restorative justice processes

The <u>Restorative Justice Integrity Act (AB 2833)</u> – a bill that will safeguard the integrity of Restorative Justice processes across California – was recently introduced in the California State Assembly. "As we shift our responses to harm to a more restorative method, it is key to ensure people can engage fully and honestly in the Restorative Justice process," said Fatimeh Khan of AFSC.

AFSC CA Healing Justice staff also recommend this <u>article</u> that challenges the idea that more policing leads to lower crime.
