AFSC Michigan: End the videotaping of strip searches in women's prison

Prison officers in Michigan are conducting strip searches of incarcerated women while wearing active body cameras. This practice is a clear violation of Michigan law, which makes it a felony to record individuals in a state of undress without consent.
