Helping everyone in Oregon "Know Your Rights"

In response to the continued attacks on our friends, family, neighbors and community members without status, AFSC Oregon Project Voice is offering Know Your Rights (KYR) information and resources to protect against ICE detentions, arrests and raids. Although Oregon's "Sanctuary Law" prevents local and state police from taking part in federal immigration enforcement actions, it does not prevent ICE, Border Patrol and DHS agents from terrorizing and arresting community members without status. Communities resist bill to narrow California's Sanctuary Law

Pedro Rios of AFSC reports that a small group of elected officials held a press event recently to announce <u>legislation</u> that would violate the wishes of Californians and existing state law as upheld by the 9th Circuit in 2019. "Our communities came together - from the north, east, and south County," Pedro says. "Unionized workers, service providers, students and educators, organizers, moms and dads - and despite being harassed by rightwing youtubers - we stood for dignity and against bigotry and hate."

Defending water, protecting acequias in New Mexico

New Mexico co-directors Sayrah Namaste and Patrick Jaramillo have been advocating at the state legislature for bills protecting water and acequias, as well environmental and free speech issues. Their advocacy includes participation with the New Mexico Acequia Association, the New Mexico Acequia Commission, and the coalition "Defend New Mexico Water." Recently they supported the annual Acequia Day at the state capitol in Santa Fe, lifting up the importance of this centuries-old water democracy, and marching with shovels and songs around the capitol building. LA Freedom School provides social justice training for youth

Adalberto Rios of AFSC writes: RFP hosted a weekend Freedom School in February. AFSC supported youth from four core high schools to know their rights in the face of walkouts. Thousands of youth in Los Angeles walked out of schools in protest of Executive Orders that diminish protections for schools and churches from U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) operations.

To support the momentum of student mobilization, Freedom School participants engaged in workshops on the history and power of student protest, reflected on organizing efforts at their schools, and learned introductory concepts to community organizing.
