

## Michigan Program connects volunteers with women inside prison

The latest <u>newsletter</u> of the Michigan Criminal Justice Program features monthly volunteer orientations. These sessions help people learn more about the ways they can give their time, talents, and treasure to support Michigan's women inside prison, as well as help end life and long sentences.

Commutation workshops, also offered monthly, are building a community of people working to get women free at Women's Huron Valley prison. Volunteers develop a strong relationship with a person at the Valley to help support them in writing their commutation and planning for their freedom more generally.



# Spring fundraiser in Chicago to feature documentary on San Quentin

The <u>Chi Peace Spring Fundraiser</u> on May 21 will feature a screening of *What These Walls Won't Hold* by Adamu Chan – along with dinner, laughter and conversation. The film is a powerful documentary exploring life inside San Quentin State Prison during the COVID-19 pandemic, offering an intimate look at the resilience, solidarity, and hope of incarcerated individuals. Drawing from his own experience, Chan highlights the strength of community, the fight for justice, and the enduring human spirit within and beyond prison walls.



#### Community survey in St. Louis points to need for stronger support systems

The St. Louis Peacebuilding Program recently shared the results of its community survey. Recommendations from the survey include the following ways to better support Black youth in St. Louis:

- Expand Mental Health and Trauma support
- Reform school discipline
- Create safe, creative spaces
- Increase economic opportunities
- Promote restorative practices
