International tribunal condemns U.S. border officials for killing

In 2010, U.S. border agents brutally beat and killed Anastasio Rojas, a San Diego father of five. AFSC has supported his family's quest for justice since. In 2022, Anastasio's widow and attorneys brought their case to the Inter-American Commission on Human Rights. They argued that the United States' "use of force" laws violate international human rights standards. Recently, the commission ruled that border officials were responsible for Anastasio's death. They also called for reopening the investigation and implementing sweeping reforms.
