Oregon-Washington Project Voice

Work with partners yields important wins for immigrant justice in Oregon

AFSC staff Alonso Oliveros and Pedro Sosa are very pleased to report on these 2025 legislative wins in Oregon:

1. \$15 million for Universal Legal Representation to help detained community members without status to access lawyers to mitigate or stop deportation proceedings

2. \$2 million for the Farmworker Disaster Relief Fund

3. \$750,000 for Indigenous Language Justice to facilitate access to interpretation services for indigenous speaking communities

4. Partial investment in the Home Fund to provide rental assistance for working families

Alonso's **report** includes a list of all our partners in this work to "ensure that Oregon welcomes and values our immigrant neighbors, friends and family."

Roots for Peace (RFP) Program, Los Angeles

Youth speak truth to power in LA

Roots for Peace continues its work in coalition to push for non-police responses on the LA transit system. Their approach includes bringing young people to the LA County Metropolitan Transportation Authority. One youth participant reflected, "With sweaty palms and a shaky voice, I garnered an immense amount of courage to display solidarity with people who had been directly impacted by Metro's decisions. I addressed people who would be in danger of being detained based on negative assumptions due to the color of their skin. I told the story of a mother who unfairly lost her son because of a police altercation on a bus. But most importantly, I addressed generations of people who needed hope in a moment of despair."

Hundreds rally to free civil rights leader in Colorado

Dozens of organizations, musicians (above) and clergy hosted an all-day action in Aurora, CO on July 7 to call for the release of Jeanette Vizguerra, an incredible civil rights activist, leader, and mother in Colorado who has been fighting for justice and safety for undocumented communities for decades. The action also called for sufficient food and medical care for all detainees –-and the closure of ICE's forprofit detention run by GEO. Jennifer Piper of AFSC is <u>quoted</u> about the event.

Speaking out against increased ICE raids and human rights abuses

Pedro Rios of AFSC was recently <u>interviewed</u> about the huge increase in ICE arrests in the San Diego area – and what's to come. "The unprecedented budget for increasing ICE operations, including detention, including all of how they're able to operate with other government agencies, is reckless," Pedro says. "What we will see is a trampling of [not just] basic constitutional rights but human rights as well."

While policies can be dry and technical, they're important: they define when weapons can be used against communities. In Oakland, these weapons have historically been used disproportionately against Black and Brown residents – and they've also been used against protesters. Come observe the next meeting!
