Commutation Project changes lives in Michigan

Everyone deserves a second chance. For many in prison, that opportunity never comes. Instead, the U.S. criminal legal system overly relies on life or long sentences. AFSC's Michigan Criminal Justice Program is working to change that. Our Commutation Project pairs women serving life and long-term sentences with volunteers on the outside. Through visits, phone calls, and letters, they learn from each other and work toward applying for commutation and release. Read more about this work, directed by Adalia Kirby of AFSC.
